Our Community

St Mark's College is home to 245 students, predominantly undergraduates, studying at the University of Adelaide, UniSA and Flinders University. The College also has a small number of postgraduate and academic residents.

The College is committed to maintaining a diverse community and sees this as key to a successful residential college experience. There are roughly equal numbers of male and female students from metropolitan and rural South Australia as well as representation from each of the other states and territories and from overseas. Students bring with them a diverse range of experiences and are studying across a broad range of faculties.

Student Life

College Club

The College Club is at the heart of student life and activity at St Mark's. All students are required to be members of the Club, which is led by an annually elected Committee. Each year the College Club coordinates an impressive range of activities and events including O'Week, The College Ball, Marksfeast, Arts Evenings, the College Play, Marksfeast art show, The Lion Magazine, community service and environment programs.

Events and experiences are designed to appeal to the College's broad mix of residents, and student participation is vital to the success of all activities. Students are encouraged to contribute their ideas and challenge themselves with new experiences as part of College life.

Charitable Foundation

The Charitable Foundation runs events and initiatives to raise funds for identified groups and charities in the community. There are also opportunities for volunteering and community service throughout the year.

Drama

The College play is a major event on the College calendar and offers a broad range of opportunities for students with an interest in acting, stage management, costumes and make-up as well as technical production such as sound and lighting.

Individual students also have the opportunity to present dramatic pieces, monologues and comedy items as part of the regular Arts Evenings.

Music



Music is an important and popular part of College life. Arts Evenings are held throughout the year and are open to all students wishing to present a music, dance or drama performance.

The College Choir is coordinated each year by a senior student and piano accompanist and offers participation and performance opportunities for students from all year levels. Regular performances include the Opening and Final services in St Peter's Cathedral and Founders' Day in April.

Visual Art

Marksfeast for the Eyes is the annual Art Show, enabling students to showcase their works of art, including drawing, painting, photography and sculpture. Students photographers are encouraged to take photos at College events throughout the year.

Sport

Sport is an important part of College life, and brings the whole College together in support of its teams and individual athletes across a range of events. The inter-collegiate competition – where the five colleges compete across 11 sports for the prestigious Ian Douglas Irving Cup – is competitive and enjoyable, providing participation opportunities for men and women with varying levels of skill, and spectators alike.

St Mark's fields a team in every intercollege sport including swimming, tennis, debating, netball, volleyball, table tennis, basketball, soccer, hockey, football and athletics.

Publications

The annual College magazine, "The Lion" is edited by a student-led committee, elected each year by the College Club. The magazine offers scope for students to engage their literary, journalistic and photographic talents.

St Mark's College Facilities

Located in North Adelaide, just a short walk from the city campuses of The University of Adelaide and UniSA, St Mark's is nestled in spacious and beautiful grounds with exceptional recreational facilities. Lawn tennis courts and other manicured areas provide magnificent outdoor spaces for all students to enjoy.

Academic Centre

The Ian and Pamela Wall Academic Centre provides state of the art information access and learning facilities. Suitable for individual and group study, the Centre incorporates three separate tutorial rooms with access to presentation equipment.

As well as its collection of texts in most areas of study, the Centre also contains many reference works and sets of past exam papers. It subscribes to a number of relevant journals, and its collection is regularly updated by new acquisitions. There is also a collection of recreational fiction.

The Library Reserve Collection houses rare and specialised textbooks suited to various professions such as the health sciences, engineering, or viticulture. The Collection also houses various anatomical models available for student use.

Car parking

Adjacent the Academic Centre is the College's secure and under cover car park, with space for 100 cars available for an additional fee.

Grounds

St Mark's is proud of its grounds which are the most spacious of the Adelaide colleges. In addition to the tennis courts, there are a number of outdoor spaces at the College for all students to enjoy.

In 2016 a special project was undertaken as part of the College's Master Plan to redevelop the now decommissioned car park area in the north-west corner of the grounds. This area offers a magnificent outdoor leisure space for students. In addition, further work will be carried out to update the existing pond courtyard and surrounding gardens ensuring the highest standard of outdoor amenity for College students.

Food

Three meals are served each day in the Grenfell-Price Dining Hall. Breakfast consists of cereals, toast, fruit, yoghurt and cooked options. On Sundays a very popular brunch is served, with continental options available for those requiring an early start. Lunch includes a self-serve salad and sandwich bar as well as hot foods. Students unable to return to College for lunch have the option of preparing a packed lunch at breakfast.

Formal Hall is held on Monday – Thursday nights with table service and the wearing of academic gowns. Dinner on the remaining nights is served from the counter. A weekly menu is published at the entrance to the Dining Hall and on the student wiki.

The quality and choice of food is excellent. All meals have vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free options. Prospective students should discuss any other special dietary requirements during the application process.

Guests are welcome for a meal in the Dining Hall for a small extra charge.



Accommodation

The majority of first-year students live in the Newland and Hawker Annexe buildings, with some also in the Memorial Building. First-year student rooms are all similar in size and are equipped with a bed, wardrobe, desk, chair, bookshelves and wireless internet.

Groups of rooms are serviced by a unisex bathroom and a utility room which has a fridge, microwave and kettle. Automatic washing machines, clothes dryers, clothes lines and ironing facilities are also provided.

Rooms for senior students differ in size and amenity and, along with a number of flats comprising separate bedrooms, bathroom, laundry, lounge and kitchenette, are allocated based on academic achievement and other criteria.

Information Technology

Wireless internet access and networked printing is available throughout the College. Assistance for students experiencing IT difficulties is available.

Music Facilities

There are several rooms available for music rehearsal around the College including the Ballroom with baby grand piano, the Greenland Music Room, band practice room and the Chapel with upright piano.

Gymnasium and Sporting Facilities

The Allister McLeod gymnasium provides a first-class fitness facility for all St Mark's students.

Other sporting facilities include grass tennis courts, table tennis table, foosball and a full-sized billiard table. The Aquatic Centre is situated within walking distance of College, and provides swimming facilities at reasonable rates with a student discount. The University of Adelaide and the University of South Australia have established gym facilities on campus and the adjacent parklands areas allow for jogging and other sporting opportunities.

Enrichment

Academic Programs

A program of weekly tutorials is conducted by senior students, postgraduate students, university lecturers and tutors. The tutorials provide a small-group learning environment with a broad range of subjects and academic disciplines offered.

Guest Speaker Series

Student coordinators work with the College Master and Dean to facilitate an interesting program of guest speakers each year. Affectionately known as "Port 'n Talks", these events are sometimes faculty-specific but most often are designed to meet particular interests of the students and address relevant events and experiences in the broader community and around the world.

Wellbeing and Resilience program

The College is committed to the health and wellbeing of all students. The Committee organises Wellbeing Week twice per year, with a program of physical and mental

health activities. Regular yoga sessions during the study period, and a focus on nutrition on Wellbeing Wednesdays complements our ongoing program.

Mentor Program

The Mentoring Program, coordinated by the Chief Mentor and the Chaplain, is an integral component of the College's commitment to developing the individual as a whole.

Mentors are senior members of the College appointed by the Master, committed to the education and personal development of each student in the St Mark's College community. Mentors have experience and understanding of the College and university and the program aims to assist new students with the transition to university and College life.

Personal Development



St Mark's Scholarships

St Mark's offers a range of scholarships, prizes and bursaries to support students with their living expenses while at College. 

Student Applications

St Mark's welcomes applications from students who are currently enrolled or intend to enrol at The University of Adelaide, The University of South Australia or Flinders University.

Application Process

Applications for new students open in July for commencement in February of the following year. Prospective students can apply online through the St Mark's College website www.stmarkscollege.com.au.

Step 1: Research the College and accommodation options, view the website, make a time to tour the college

Step 2: Submit an online application via the student portal. This is a simple 15-step process for you to provide your background

Step 3: Provide a character and academic reference. Templates can be found on our website or you can provide a school report. Attach a passport sized photograph to your application

Step 4: Pay the application fee online and confirm and submit your application

Step 5: Successful applicants will be contacted to make a time for a personal or phone interview

Step 6: Following the interview, you will receive notification that you have been placed on the waitlist, or given an offer of residency

Step 7: If you are successful in your offer of residency, you can choose to accept, decline or defer your place. If you accept a provisional offer, further information will be sent to you following university offers in January

Fees and Charges

The College sets its annual fees in December each year and the schedule of fees can be found on the St Mark's web site: www.stmarkscollege.com.au/application/fees

College fees cover living expenses including all meals (including weekends and holidays), weekly room cleaning, utilities, internet access, pastoral support and access to the College's extensive academic tutorial program, gymnasium, library and Chapel.


St Mark's follows the University of Adelaide academic calendar, however accommodates the schedules of students at UniSA and Flinders University. Our residential dates for students who are enrolled in a trimester program can also be flexible.

Our 40-week academic year allows students to stay in Adelaide during the vacation periods, without having to pack up your room. Meals are still provided during the holidays.

Additional Fees and Charges

There are additional charges for your application fee, entrance fee and College Club Membership. A refundable deposit is also payable on entry. A full list of these fees, including additional charges for parking and vacation residence, is available on the College website. Accommodation is also available during the summer vacation period at a set price.





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
