

# ST. MARK'S COLLEGE.

## Preliminary Prospectus and Entry Form.

### OBJECTS OF THE COLLEGE.

1. St. Mark's College has been founded to provide residential college life for undergraduates of the University of Adelaide. The founders hope that the College will appeal not only to country students who are compelled to live in lodgings, but to others whose homes are in or near Adelaide. Experience has amply proved that the association of men in college under proper discipline tends to a broadening of ideals and a maturity of judgment which cannot be obtained in any other way.

### GOVERNMENT.

2. St. Mark's College has been founded under the control and management of an elected Council representing the Church of England and those who have contributed towards the funds. From the first it was decided to make the College of an Anglican character, as the principle of denominational colleges has proved most satisfactory in the Universities of Sydney, Melbourne, and Brisbane. St. Mark's, however, is OPEN TO STUDENTS OF ALL DENOMINATIONS.

### PROGRESS.

3. The founders of the College have been working to achieve their object for more than two years. Prominent citizens who favoured the movement have contributed some £13,000, with which has been purchased the large residence of the late Sir John William Downer, on Pennington Terrace, with the spacious block of land adjoining. This property provides room for the extensions which have been planned, while the beauty of the position, fronting the Park Lands, and its proximity to the University and University Oval make it an ideal site for the purpose required.

### ACCOMMODATION.

4. It has been decided to open the College in March, 1925. The Master will be appointed at an early date. Each student will have a bed-sitting room. There will be a spacious Common Room and Dining Hall.

### FEES.

5. The Executive Committee has carefully examined the financial position and fees of residential colleges in the other States. These institutions have the advantage of endowments and large numbers of students. In almost all cases fees vary from 95 guineas to 120 guineas, covering the academic year of 39 to 40 weeks, excluding many extras. Charges for residence during the vacation are from 2 to 2½ guineas a week.

6. It is expected that in the case of St. Mark's the fees will be about 110 guineas per academic year, and will provide each student with

(a) Such tuition as can be arranged by the Master and Honorary Fellows of the College.

(b) The use of a bed-sitting room.

(c) Necessary furniture, with the exception of bed linen and table linen. Laundry will be an extra.

(d) Board and light.

Rooms will be allotted in order of application.

### ENTRANCE.

7. It is hoped that all men who wish to avail themselves of the opportunities offered by the foundation of St. Mark's College will fill up the attached entry form and send it without delay to the Secretary. Though it is expected that further subscriptions will be obtained during the year, and that a considerable portion of the furniture will be provided from the proceeds of a large fete in November next, the successful opening of the College will depend largely upon the number of men who apply for admission.
